Mallinckrodt's Raleigh site produces acetaminophen (APAP) and its key precursor p-aminophenol (PAP). The only source for APAP in the western hemisphere, Mallinckrodt's operation employs more than 220 people who collectively manufacture a substantial portion of the globe's APAP demand. The site operates 24/7 utilizing a combination of batch manufacturing and continuous manufacturing processes. The Raleigh site, together with Mallinckrodt Specialty Generics' sites in Missouri, Illinois and New York, represent the single largest, vertically-integrated and entirely domestic generic manufacturing network in the United States.
